At the end of Year 9, students will complete an unaided 60 minute assessment, which will assess the application of their substantive and disciplinary knowledge gained over the course of the year. The assessment will focus on the Health and the People topic, and feature a combination of source and written analysis questions focusing on the second-order concepts of significance and similarities. This will be assessed by class teachers using AQA mark schemes for the Health and the People, c.1000-Present Day unit.
